- 2. A risk assessment has been conducted by the MPS in relation to the risks to me and others in respect of the Inquiry's decision about whether a restriction order should be made. I agree with the contents of that assessment and support it in respect of my real name. However, I am also concerned about releasing my cover name as well as the name of the group that I infiltrated.

SDS Deployment

- 3. I was deployed with the SDS in 1969. I answered an advert in for people who were interested in the following the philosophy of I attended that first meeting. Thereafter, I attended meetings of this group and reported on their activities.
- Despite the fact that I was deployed for a short period of time it does not alter the fact that I was deployed and therefore am still vulnerable.

Cover Name


- 5. My cover name was
- 6. I am concerned about the release of my cover name because it is contrary to all the expectations that I had during my MPS and SDS career. When I joined the SDS there was an expectation of secrecy. My cover name was kept secret subsequent to my deployment. I am unsure how as to how the release of my cover name can fulfil the terms of reference of the Inquiry.

Group name

7. I also have concerns about releasing the name of the group that I infiltrated. This extremist group was very small. My memory is that there was a maximum of people at its core at any time. I have concerns that a member of that group would remember me and my name and therefore potentially cause harm, and further concerned that any group or individual of similar persuasion in the present day, may wish to cause harm to my family and I.

Real Name

8. I am concerned about the disclosure of my real name. Subsequent to my deployment I had a long and distinguished career in the police.



- If my real name was disclosed I would be concerned that there might potentially be physical harm to myself, [or family]
- 10. Furthermore, if my real name was disclosed I would be concerned that the activities of the later officers would taint my employment. I did not have any sexual relationships with my targets nor did I commit any crimes. I carried out my work professionally, and on the understanding that it would be kept confidential.

Conclusion

11. I would ask that the Inquiry agree to restrict my real name; my cover name and the name of my group.
