Redaction	Explanation for redaction
P 3 of 39	Redacted material would reveal ways in which undercover officers in general may be identified.
P 4 of 39	Redacted material would reveal ways in which intelligence sources could be identified.
P 12 of 39	Redacted material indicates the extent to which research by the Undercover Research Group is, or is not, accurate.
P 13 of 39	Redacted information would contribute towards identifying Special Demonstration Squad officers.
P 19 of 39	Redacted material indicates the extent to which research by the Undercover Research Group is, or is not, accurate.
P 21 of 39	Redacted information would reveal sensitive police techniques which would be less effective if known.
P 24 of 39 (1)	Redacted information cannot be gisted, even at a level of generality, without indicating the matter protected by the redaction.
P 24 of 39 (2) and (3)	Redacted information discusses the extent to which, if at all, information in the 'True Spies' documentary was, or was not, accurate.
P 24 of 39 (4)	Redacted information discusses the extent to which, if at all, information given by 'Peter Francis' is, or is not, accurate.
P 24 of 39 (5) (redaction continues to p 25)	Redacted information discusses the extent to which, if at all, other information under the heading 'Disclosure by former officers' is, or is not, accurate.
P 27 of 39 (2)	Redacted information contains private information relating to Bob Lambert.
P 28 of 39 (1)	Further example under the heading 'Linking information utilising open source research'.
P 28 of 39 (2)	Redacted information would reveal sensitive police techniques which would be less effective if known.
P 28 of 39 (3) (redaction continues to p 29)	Redacted information discusses the extent to which, if at all, purported identifications are, or are not, accurate.
Pp 29 - 31 of 39	Redacted information discloses the identity of an officer with provisional anonymity.
P 34 of 39	Redacted information gives an example of the inadvertent disclosure of information.
