2. "The Wandsworth Branch of the Anarchist Workers Association held their first private meeting on Thursday, 10 July 1975 at Privacy, the home of Privacy. The meeting, which was attended by eleven persons, began at 7.30 pm and concluded at 11.30 pm. Privacy

3. JIM PICKFORD and Privacy welcomed those present and introduced themselves and Privacy, Kingston Branch, who attended as an observer. Individuals were then asked to introduce themselves to each other. Privacy

4. It was decided that the business side of the meeting should be dealt with quickly in order that a discussion could follow and that Privacy should be the chairman.

5. Privacy reported on a meeting that he had attended on Tuesday, 6 July, at St Brides near Fleet Street, where a Portuguese man had spoken about the Portuguese newspaper 'Republica'. Privacy gave a brief history of the paper and stated that it had been handed over to the workers.

6. Privacy then spoke on an article that appeared in the Sunday Observer newspaper supplement dealing with a tribe of natives in Africa. She compared their plight with that of the libertarian struggle of the workers of the world and suggested that the Branch found out more about the situation and sought ways to assist.

7. Privacy spoke about the proposed Windsor pop festival. He informed the meeting that because the two main organisers had been imprisoned various aspects of the festival were being organised by separate individuals in the hope that it would still be a success. He advocated that as the proposed banning of the festival was an attack against freedom the group should support the festival by attending. He said that although the site was enclosed by a high fence it was likely that holes would be made in the fence to give access.

A discussion then followed on points raised by **Privacy**, **Privacy** and **Privacy**, both of whom had shown an interest in joining the group. **Privacy** asked about the future of the Association and **Privacy** wished to know how the workers were supposed to take over their places of work as proposed by the IMA. The only point of particular interest that arose from this discussion was that both **Privacy** considered that violence on a large scale would be needed to bring about the 'revolution'.
