SUBJECT

1. The following information has been received from a secret and reliable source:-

2. [REDACTED] Privacy, a leading member of the Revolutionary Communist Party (RCP), recently reviewed security measures within the Party and has produced a document based upon his findings.

Revolutionary Communist Party

3. Members are advised to ensure that they are not followed from their homes to places of work, or to or from any of the Party premises. They are also advised not to leave political material on view at their homes which may attract the attention of landlords and/or fellow tenants. Vehicle owners must keep them 'legal', i.e. taxed, insured and with valid MOT certificates, and also as clean as possible to avoid the attention of police.

4. The attention of members is drawn to methods of disposal of Party waste paper or pamphlets, because 'the state spends sums of money to have the dustbins of political activists searched for any useful information'. Members and contacts, whilst working together, should not discuss amongst themselves where they live or work and conversation should be restricted to non-sensitive topics. Any members who incur debts must report the fact to the Party immediately as 'debts, as well as offences concerning drugs and motor vehicles can be used by the state to blackmail potential informants'. Consequently, any involvement with drugs or 'unsanctioned' crime is strictly forbidden.

5. Whilst the contents of the document may not be unexpected it is interesting to note the wide field of potential security leaks which is covered and indicates the emphasis placed upon security by the Party despite their continual desire for publicity."
